INFORMATION SHEET FOR STUDENTS

- **(Background)** The LLM stream in Asian Law has three tutorial courses: LAWS4131 *Tutorial in Japanese Law and Language*; LAWS4132 *Tutorial in Advanced Japanese Law*; and LAWS4136 *Tutorial in Advanced Chinese Law*. The tutorial courses allow students to undertake a supervised program of study in a specialised area of Asian law.
- **(Nature of tutorial study)** Students may undertake any of the tutorial courses via online study with optional face-to-face support. Tutorial study allows students a degree of choice over what content they would like to cover in their program of study.
- **(Availability)** Each of the tutorial courses is available in the summer, semester 1, winter or semester 2. Enrolment, however, is by application only and is subject to approval (see further below).
- **(Enrolment procedures)** To enrol in any of the tutorial courses, student must complete the reverse side of this enrolment form and then submit it to the Student Administration Office. Online enrolment is not available. All applications must be discussed with, and approved by, the Convenor of the Asian Law stream, Leon Wolff (leon.wolff@unsw.edu.au).
- **(Approval criteria)** Approval to enrol in any of the tutorial courses is subject to:
 - the availability of the Convenor of the Asian and Comparative Law stream to supervise the program of study;
 - evidence that the student has an appropriate educational background in Asian law, comparative law, Asian studies or the Japanese language (where applicable) to support the applied program of study — for example, students should have completed a three-year university degree in the Japanese language to be allowed enrolment in LAWS4131 *Tutorial in Japanese Law and Language*; and
 - evidence that the student has the initiative, time management skills and self-motivation to cope with supervised tutorial study.
- **(Study options)**
 - Students who would like to take one of the existing courses in the Asian Law stream when it is not timetabled for that session (eg, LAWS4130 *Japanese Law and Politics* in the summer) should seek approval to enrol in either LAWS4132 *Tutorial in Advanced Japanese Law* (for Japan-specific courses) or LAWS4136 *Tutorial in Advanced Chinese Law* (for China-specific courses).
 - Students with an interest in an applied topic in Japanese law (eg, Japanese constitutionalism) should seek approval to enrol in LAWS4132 *Tutorial in Advanced Japanese Law*.
 - Students with an interest in an applied topic in Chinese law (eg, Chinese intellectual property law) should seek approval to enrol in LAWS4136 *Tutorial in Advanced Chinese Law*.
 - Students who would like to study Japanese primary and secondary legal texts in the original language should seek approval to enrol in LAWS4131 *Tutorial in Japanese Law and Language*.
