Australian Human Rights Centre (Human Rights and Disability Project)

The Human Rights and Disability Project within the Australian Human Rights Centre is working on the Australian NGO Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) Shadow Report with 5 other community legal and disability organisations. The Project has worked with the First People's Disability Network and the Aboriginal Disability Network (NSW). As part of the Shadow Report process the project is producing a standalone report that focuses on the status of aboriginal and Torres Strait Island people with disability.

Publication internships

Australian Human Rights Journal Intern

The *Australian Human Rights Journal* is the first academic publication in Australia devoted exclusively to human rights, bringing together scholarships from many disciplines. The student intern is exposed to scholarship on human rights from a variety of perspectives other than law, working together with academics from a variety of fields and dealing, on a daily basis, with submissions from leading thinkers about human rights issues.

Australian Indigenous Law Review

The *Australian Indigenous Law Review* is a quarterly, peer-reviewed publication providing a broad range of legal information and commentary on issues affecting Indigenous peoples in Australia and around the world. The *Australian Indigenous Law Review* is primarily an academic publication, although its audience includes practitioners, government departments, Indigenous organisations and other NGOs.

Australasian Journal of Natural Resources Law and Policy

The Australasian Journal of Natural Resources Law and Policy is a refereed journal devoted to all aspects of natural resources management. It is policy oriented and represents a valuable source of information and debate for environmental lawyers, scholars, conservationists, policy makers and resource developers.

Human Rights Defender Intern

The *Human Rights Defender* is a human rights magazine which presents information and comment on a broad range of current issues in human rights. It also seeks to provide a platform for the expression of critical thinking and the discussion of conceptual developments in human rights. The magazine is published three times a year and though it is not an academic publication, *The Human Rights Defender* has many academic authors, human rights workers and activists in Australia and overseas.

Indigenous Law Bulletin

The Indigenous Law Bulletin (ILB) was created in 1981 as one of the first projects of the Aboriginal Law Research Centre at the University of New South Wales. The ILB has provided Indigenous and non-Indigenous readers from diverse personal and professional backgrounds with quality commentary on the relationship between Indigenous peoples and the law. The ILB provides a space for people in the community to write about the impact of the Australian legal system upon Indigenous Australians.
