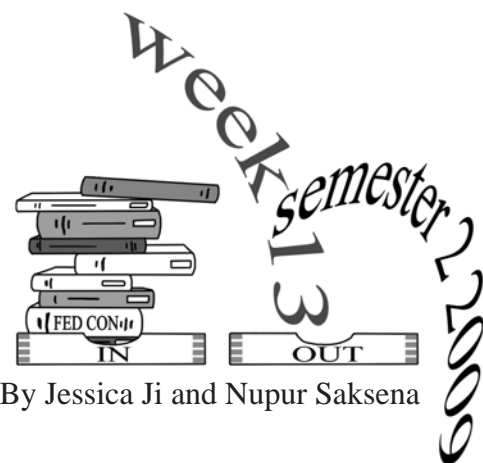

UNSW Law Journal Recruitment

The UNSW Law Journal will soon be recruiting new Editorial Board members for 2010. An information will be held next week, **Monday 19 October** and **Tuesday 20 October** at **1pm in Room 203** of the Law Building. At this meeting you will have the opportunity to learn about the UNSW Law Journal and its recruitment process.

About the Journal

The UNSW Law Journal is one of Australia's leading academic legal journals and one of the few to be produced entirely by a student board. It is one of the most widely cited legal reviews in Australia and is renowned for its noteworthy and topical content aimed at contributing to contemporary legal debate.

The UNSW Law Journal has a diverse and influential readership. It is distributed among Justices of the High Court of Australia, Federal Court of Australia and Supreme Court of NSW, as well as subscribers including government departments, non-government organisations, law firms and over 250 universities worldwide. Submissions for publication are received from local and international academics, judges and legal professionals from a wide range of practice areas.

Responsibilities of Editorial Board Members

- Scrutinising and editing papers selected for publication for two General Issues and one Thematic Issue per year;
- Attending regular Editorial Board meetings;
- Attending Journal publication launches, mail outs and any other Journal-related events that may occur from time to time.

At a senior level, members of the Editorial Board also have the opportunity to assume editorial responsibility for a Forum or Thematic issue of the Journal. Course credits are also awarded for these positions.

Appointment as a member of the Editorial Board is highly sought after and prestigious within the legal community: it is a valuable addition to one's CV. Alumni of the Journal currently hold tipstaff positions in various courts, including the High Court.

Recruitment for General Member of the Editorial Board

There are 3 stages to the recruitment process. Applicants are first required to submit:

1. An academic transcript
2. A curriculum vitae
3. A covering letter detailing relevant skills and reasons for applying.

Successful applicants will then be requested to complete a substantial editing exercise and attend an interview with members of the Executive Committee. The existing members of the Board will then hold a meeting to elect the best candidates on to the Board.

Recruitment Timeline for General Member Applications

1. **Friday 5 February**, 9 am: closing date for applications. Please submit applications addressed to the UNSW Law Journal Executive at law.journal@unsw.edu.au
2. **Monday 8 February**: Applicants moving on to the next stage of the recruitment process receive an editing exercise. Applicants will also be asked to state preferences for interview times(interviews will be held between 24-26 February (O-Week).

3. **Monday 15 February**, 9 am: Editing exercise due.

4. **Wednesday 24 February-Friday 26 February**: Interviews with all applicants who completed the editing exercise.

5. **Week 1, 2009**: the existing members of the Board will elect the best applicants to the Board.

Internship Opportunity: Karadzic Defense Team - The Hague (ICTY)

Dr. Radovan Karadzic, the former President of the Republika Srpska in Bosnia-Herzegovina, is currently awaiting trial at the ICTY for genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes. Dr. Karadzic is representing himself, but he has a small team of international criminal lawyers helping him prepare his defense. In that capacity, Peter Robinson, one of the leading defense attorneys at the ad hoc tribunals, and Kevin Jon Heller are looking for a small number of interns to work with the defense team in The Hague during 2010.

The positions are unpaid - and unfortunately there are absolutely no funds to help interns with expenses - but this is a unique opportunity to be involved in one of the **highest-profile and most important international prosecutions since World War II**. Interning with the defense team will not involve clerical work; interns will be asked to evaluate evidence, research complex legal issues, and help draft motions. Dr. Karadzic's trial should begin no later than early 2010, so interns will also be intimately involved in trial preparations.

Interns will be expected to be in residence in The Hague for a minimum of two months, with three months being desirable.

Given the nature of the work involved, interns must have taken at least an introductory course on public international law. Additional coursework in international criminal law or international humanitarian law is desirable, though not required.

We hope to enhance participants' confidence, self esteem, team building and problem solving skills through these activities.

The program runs between four and nine days in the community. Applicants are required to arrive in Darwin a day prior to community departure for cultural and leadership training.

Upcoming trips have been scheduled for the December/January school break in several communities in the Top End of the Northern Territory.

Requirements

Please note that if selected you will be required to provide a criminal history check and a criminal record may preclude you from participating in this program.

Applications are now open to volunteer on the Remote Communities Holiday Program. The application closing date for the December/January holiday programs is 30th October 2009. As places are limited any applications received after this time unfortunately will not be considered.

Please note: Costs covered include flights to and from the community you have been selected for, accommodation, food and incidentals whilst in the community. Volunteers however must pay their own way to Darwin and any costs associated with staying in Darwin prior to and after the programs.

Interested people under 30 years of age are encouraged to apply, especially those who aim to pursue a career within remote communities and those with skills in the arts, music and sport.

About the Toongabbie Legal Centre Inc.

Toongabbie Legal Centre Inc. (TLC) is a not-for-profit community-based initiative resourcing those in need in the Toongabbie area, established 17th March 2007.

Over recent years, a small group of solicitors and other professionals based in Western Sydney had become more aware of the need for increased access to legal services in their area. Responding to this need, they have joined together to launch a community Legal Centre in Toongabbie. The initiative started with a small meeting in Toongabbie during November 2005. A series of meetings followed.

On 25th November 2006, the Management Committee of the Centre conducted a Consultation within the community regarding the need for such a centre and the nature of the potential issues faced by those who might use such a centre. As a result of this Consultation, it is anticipated that the services will be accessed typically by the following groups of community members:

- those with financial constraints
- non-English speaking
- recently-arrived migrants and international students
- especially migrant women and children
- refugees and those on humanitarian visas
- needy youth
- unemployed
- those affected by issues related to employment, compensation
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

The Mission of TLC is to provide legal assistance and advice to culturally, socially and economically disadvantaged persons in the Toongabbie and surrounding areas who are unable to seek the help of commercial lawyers, or who have difficulty in accessing legal services.

TLC is a community initiative providing free legal advice, referral service and information to those who cannot afford to pay commercialised and for those who do not know where to go when they encounter a legal problem.

TLC exercises its mission through Service in:

- legal advice
- information
- arranging referrals to other relevant bodies or to individual legal practices or other services
- advocacy work in respect of policies and legislation relevant to the client group
- contributing to law reform processes
- community legal education and on-going consultation with local communities.

Priority is given to clients from the target groups within the Toongabbie and surrounding suburbs.

After a day long induction and training for all volunteers held on 6 October 2007, TLC commenced services on 13 October 2007. TLC held its second induction and training on 29 August 2009.

TLC is open on Thursdays (6 pm and 9 pm) and Saturdays (9.30 am and 1 pm). But Drop-in service operates between 6.30 pm and 8.30 pm on Thursdays and between 10 am – 12.30 pm on Saturdays at the Hall next to St Anthony's Church, 27 Aurelia Street Toongabbie (close to Toongabbie Railway Station).

The Centre operates with the help of volunteers who are solicitors, migration agents, law students, social workers, financial planners and experts in finance, as well as IT specialists.

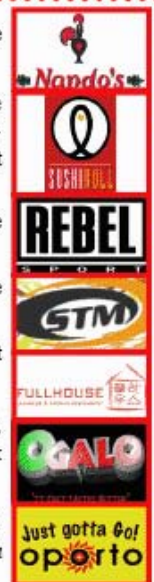
