

## AURORA PROJECT

I spent 6 weeks of my summer holidays completing an Aurora Project Internship at the Edmund Rice Centre (ERC) in Flemington, Sydney. The Internship Program introduces students and graduates to career opportunities in native title, policy, social justice and Indigenous affairs. The program aims to provide assistance to under-resourced and over-worked Native Title Representative Bodies (NTRBs) and Native Title Service Providers (NTSPs) as well as various other organisations working in these areas including Indigenous corporations, government bodies, community groups, not-for-profit and policy organisations.

I was placed in the Indigenous Education Unit of the ERC, which is a non-government organisation dedicated to continuing the work of Edmund Rice and the Christian Brothers network. The Indigenous Education Unit addresses a variety of Indigenous issues through a large number of school and community workshops. The centre also provides a variety of cross cultural immersion programs into Indigenous communities in far north west NSW in an attempt to engage the participants with Indigenous issues both past and present, cultural heritage and traditional practices. The immersion, which is usually a week in length, transports participants to Dubbo, Brewarrina, Lightning Ridge and Goodooga where they will be able to take part in a variety of hands-on traditional activities. The immersion aims to build relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, advance the reconciliation debate, help people to develop the skills needed to advance the reconciliation process, develop a first-hand understanding of social justice issues, allow people to understand Indigenous perspectives and dispel myths and stereotypes about Indigenous people. The primary aim of the program is just to give people the opportunity to engage with Indigenous peoples within Indigenous communities, to have discussions and open dialogue around issues that sometime seem too 'scary' to address. The underlying foundation of the program is the conversations that take place between community members and the participants, hence the name of the program, "Let's Talk".

As an intern in this unit, I was given the opportunity to be involved in every aspect of the organisation process for two of the year's immersions. The staff in the Indigenous education unit helped me to understand the necessity for programs such as this and the importance of educating people about Indigenous culture as a tool for reconciliation. The immersions allow participants to be educated about Indigenous life - past and present, by Indigenous people and witness the true impact of colonisation and years of disadvantage. I was also inspired by the commitment of the staff to continue this program over the past eleven years.

At the conclusion of my internship I have been able to reflect on the impact my time at the ERC has had on me. My eyes have been opened to the potential gains that can be made through community-based programs, which aim to educate and increase awareness about Indigenous issues. I feel that I myself have been further educated about the issues and the work that needs to be done to continue the reconciliation process.

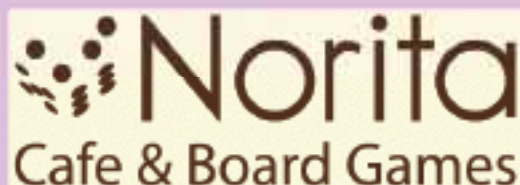

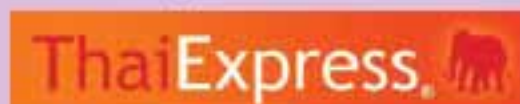
