UNSW LAW MOOTERS DECLARED NATIONAL CHAMPIONS!

Congratulations to Matthew Cobb-Clark, Smriti Arora and Jason Qian for their grand final win in the 2010 AAT National Mooting Competition!

The competition consists of five knockout rounds, held at the Administrative Appeals Tribunal in Sydney, and judged by Members, Senior Members, Deputy Presidents, and the President of the AAT. From August to October 2010, UNSW sent three teams, each comprising two advocates and one researcher, to compete in the state and national rounds of the competition.

Two of UNSW's AAT teams reached the national quarter-finals and semi-finals respectively. The third UNSW team, comprising Matthew Cobb-Clark and Smriti Arora as advocates and Jason Qian as researcher, went on to face off against the University of Adelaide in a closely contested grand final, presided over by President Downes, Senior Member Isenberg and Senior Member Frost. The UNSW team's hard work paid off with a strong performance in the grand final, bringing home the National Championship Cup for 2010. Matthew Cobb-Clark was also awarded best oralist.

The UNSW Law Society congratulates the teams on their achievements, and thanks their coaches, Qi Jiang and Ashley George, for their assistance.

UNSW'S 2010 ALSA CONFERENCE SUCCESS

The Australian Law Students' Association Conference, held on 12–19 July 2010, was co-hosted by the University of Adelaide, Flinders University and the University of South Australia. The NSW Young Lawyers' Environmental Law Committee's Annual Environmental Law Essay Prize is now open.

Successful candidates should submit an essay of no more than 3,000 words on the following question: *'History has shown examples of cases where science has warned about the environmental consequences of our actions and the need for legal constraints to curb behaviour. This has led to action to resolve some environmental problems but for other environmental problems the warnings have been ignored or even the underlying science challenged, leading to non-action and environmental damage.'*

Discuss the lessons learnt from past failures and how this might assist in addressing a current environmental issue.

Entrants must have been enrolled at some point in the last 12 months in a Bachelor of Laws course at any University in NSW.

First Prize: \$300, second prize: \$200, third prize: \$100.

ANJEL/BLAKE DAWSON ESSAY PRIZE IN JAPANESE LAW

Blake Dawson, one of Australia's leading law firms, has sponsored an Essay Prize for the Australian Network for Japanese Law. The prize of \$1000 is for the best research essay on Japanese law, primarily by a student (or group of students) enrolled in an Australian university. Winning essays in this competition are often later published.

ELIGIBILITY: The essay competition is open to all undergraduate and postgraduate students, whether in law or non-law disciplines, who are currently enrolled in an Australian university.

Students based at overseas institutions are also eligible if they are graduands or graduates of an Australian university and pursuing their overseas studies full-time. University lecturers pursuing part-time degrees overseas and lawyers engaged in part-time study overseas are not eligible. Past winners of the Prize are ineligible.

SUBJECT MATTER: The essay may be on any topic relating to Japanese law or justice. The essay may focus exclusively on the Japanese legal system or feature Japan as a case study in a comparative analysis of the topic.

LENGTH: The essay must be up to 10,000 words. This word length includes all references. The recommended minimum word length is 5,000 word, although ANJeL will accept shorter contributions.

JUDGING: Essays will be judged by ANJeL's three Co-Directors.

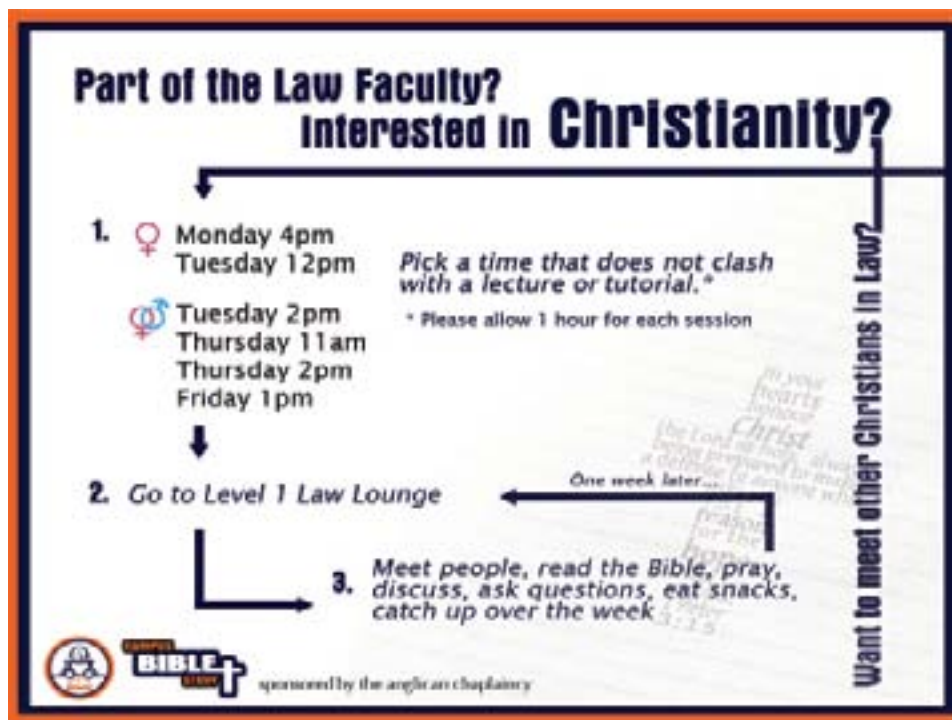

NATIONAL LIAISON OFFICER

Anti-Poverty Week was established in 2002 and is held in mid-October each year. Its main aims are to strengthen public understanding of the causes and consequences of poverty and hardship, and to encourage research, discussion and action to address the key problems. The Week involves hundreds of activities organised by community groups across Australia. Most activities are organised at State and local levels but the national level provides information, promotional material, a substantial website and other support.

The National Liaison Officer is directly responsible to Professor Julian Disney, who is National Co-Chair of Anti-Poverty Week. The National Liaison Officer's responsibilities include preparing and distributing information about poverty issues and proposed activities; encouraging participation in the Week and media coverage of issues relating to poverty and activities throughout the Week; maintaining the website, including the calendar of activities; liaising with State Chairs and community groups; and organising meetings.

The position of National Liaison Officer is available for an agreed period of at least 12 months, commencing no later than 1 December 2010. It will involve an agreed amount of work averaging about 15 hours per week. There is considerable flexibility for negotiation of the times of work to suit study or family commitments. The position will be based at the Social Justice Project which is on Level 1 of the Law Building, UNSW. Remuneration will be from \$30 to \$34 per hour, depending on qualifications and experience.

Hi, my name is Kaleesha Morris. I am a proud Indigenous woman, of both Gumbaynggirr & Torres-Strait Islander descent and I am 20 years old. I'm in my 3rd year studying an Arts/Law double degree at the University of New South Wales and I work as an Aboriginal Specialist court worker in Southern Sydney.

In February, I was privileged to be selected as an Australian Oxfam International Youth Partner. Oxfam International Youth Partnerships (OIYP) is a global leadership network made up of 300 young people from around the world. As selected partners, we undertake training and work in partnerships for a period of 3 years.

One of the first steps to kick-start this incredible experience is the OIYP Kaleidoscope event which will be held in New Delhi, India, in November. This special event will provide all OIYP Action partners with the chance to meet each other, whereby we will learn and work together, share values and experiences whilst enhancing mutual understandings across economic, cultural, thematic and geographical boundaries. There will be formal and informal workshops and discussions being held, to bring about ideas for creating positive futures in our communities. The duration of my trip over there will be 2 weeks.

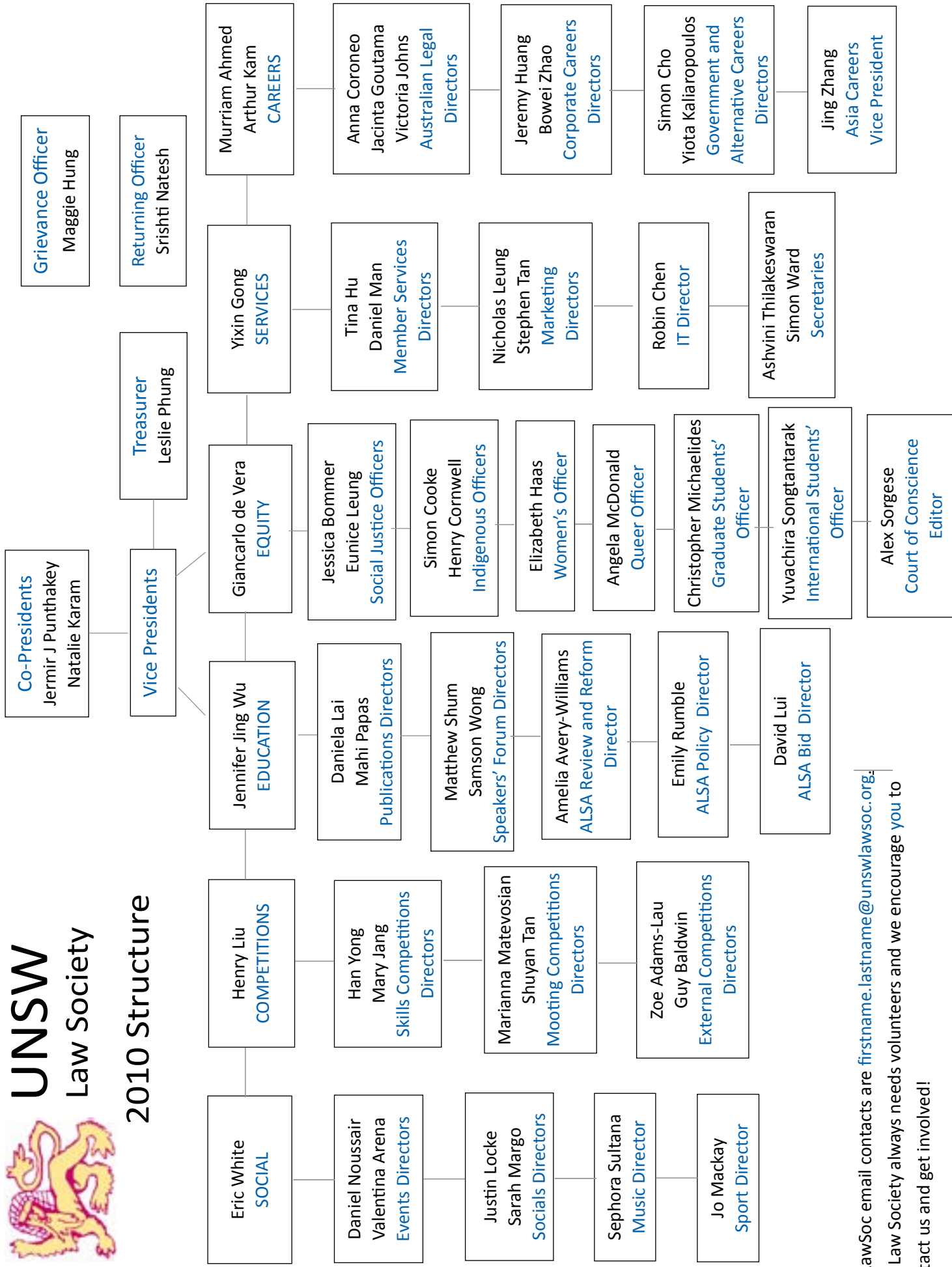

2010 Structure



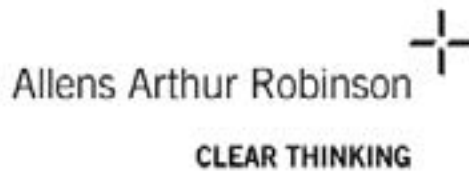
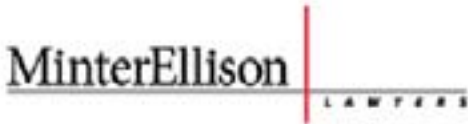
